The Division reports to both the Department of Medicine and Department of Family Practice; many of our faculty members also hold joint-appointments with Departments of Anesthesiology, Emergency Medicine and Pediatrics. The Division has developed and supported diverse Palliative Medicine providers across the province, with a major academic focus on providing education for Palliative Medicine residents along with residents and medical students of various backgrounds, accounting for over 550 learners per Academic Year.

1.0 Position Title, Objectives and Aims

The Division of Palliative Care at the University of British Columbia is pleased to invite applications for **The Hsu & Hsieh Foundation Distinguished Scholar in Palliative Care**. The overall objectives of the Distinguished Scholar are to:

- 1. Acquire and share knowledge of scientific methods and principles relating to high quality, academic research within the field of palliative care
- 2. Establish robust research project(s) to address the care of people living and dying with chronic and life-threatening illnesses
- 3. Participate as a leader and mentor within DOPC to promote research-based education and academic activities
- 4. Network and collaborate with other palliative care research champions within the province of British Columbia and beyond

Upon completion of position, the Distinguished Scholar is anticipated to be a research expert within the field of palliative care and qualify to compete successfully for local, provincial and/or national grants to further their research endeavors. The Distinguished Scholar is to aim for the future establishment of UBC DOPC Research Chair through external funding opportunities.

2.0 Position Responsibilities and Deliverables

The Hsu & Hsieh Foundation Distinguished Scholar in Palliative Care will be responsible for the following:

3.0 Position Term, Organization, Salary and Support

The Hsu & Hsieh Foundation Distinguished Scholar in Palliative Care is currently a 3-year term position. Of note, the position will be assessed on an annual basis and annual renewal will be contingent on successful completion of yearly responsibilities, tasks and deliverables as outlined in this document. This position operates under UBC Department of Medicine — Division of Palliative Care. The Distinguished Scholar reports to the UBC DOPC Division Head and their research mentor.

The Distinguished Scholar will be provided \$100,000 annual compensation (benefits as applicable included within this amount) for 0.4 FTE (i.e., 2 days per week).

The Distinguished Scholar will be primarily working remotely with access to the Division of Palliative Care shared office space (located at UBC Vancouver Campus). The Distinguished Scholar will also receive the following additional supports:

UBC Department of Medicine Research Office – \$5,000/year

- Software access
- Poster printing
- Statistical support

UBC Department of Family Practice Research Office – in-kind support up to \$5,000/year

- Research director/assistant support
- Statistical support
- Literature and Research Ethics Board support
- Logistical administrative support
- Access to office space

Salary award and supports will end should the Distinguished Scholar decide to leave the position or request an unpaid leave-of-absence of greater than 10 months duration.

4.0 Position Qualifications

The successful Hsu & Hsieh Foundation Distinguished Scholar in Palliative Care will have the following qualifications:

- Practicing British Columbia Palliative Care Physician (priority given to those in first 15 years of practice)
- Currently holds a faculty appointment in the Division of Palliative Care or is eligible to hold an appropriate faculty position in the Division
- Ability to commit 0.4 FTE (i.e., 2 days per week) for minimum 3 years to this position and start within 6 months of receipt of offer letter
- Demonstrate strong communication and writing skills, learning aptitude, passion for academia and potential for leadership

Equity and diversity are essential to academic excellence. An open and diverse community fosters the inclusion of voices that have been underrepresented or discouraged. We encourage applications from members of groups that have been marginalized on any grounds enumerated under the B.C. Human Rights Code, including sex, sexual orientation, gender identity or expression, racialization, disability, political belief, religion, marital or family status, age, and/or status as a First Nation, Metis, Inuit, or Indigenous person. All qualified candidates are encouraged to apply; however Canadians and permanent residents will be given priority.
